Batwa's livelihoods improve after getting resettled in Kisoro

The standard of living of the Batwa communities in southwestern Uganda is steadily improving, following their resettlement in Kisoro district.

The Batwa were originally forest-dwelling hunters in the Great Lakes region of Central Africa.

The Batwa are said to have migrated to Uganda from Ituri forest in the Democratic Republic of Congo.

However, in 1991, they were evicted after Mgahinga and Bwindi Impenetrable national parks were gazetted.

They, thus, became squatters. According to Abel Bizimana, the Kisoro district LC5 chairperson, the lifestyle of the Batwa has changed since they got land for resettlement.

Bizimana said the land in Gitebe, Kanaba sub-county, where some Batwa have settled, was offered by the

Adventist Development and Relief Agency (ADRA), which procured 84 acres of land for the minority group.

He noted that the Batwa are also learning some important skills that have improved their welfare

they were trained in by ADRA, such as music, dance and drama, modern farming, art and craft and tour guiding,

among others," says Bizimana. Muyove village in Buhozi parish, Busanza sub-county is one of the areas where the Batwa have settled.

Antelli Gasambi, the Moyove village LC1 chairperson, said the Batwa have contributed to

the development of the area through their various activities.

"We have planted crops for food and sale," Gasambi said.

Gasambi also credits ADRA for improving the tourism potential of the Batwa.

He said since its inception, ADRA had been supporting Batwa settlements in Kanaba Bukimbiri, Nyabwishenya, Gatera and Busanza subcounties.

Godfrey Turinawe, one of the successful agriculturalists, said ADRA's training in agriculture helped him get a job at Mutolere Hospital Food and Nutrition project.

"When I applied for training

"When I applied for training in the project, I got employment immediately after my training. I attribute all this excellence to the guidance and mentorship I got from ADRA," Turinawe said.

Pascazia Nyiraburonde said: "I am proud to say that I can now eat a balanced diet and also live in an iron-roofed house"
